Experiments are a necessary prerequisite for the adoption of medical therapies. They help determine optimal dosage and assess effects.

Why should labor market policies, and in general social policies, be exempted from similar experimental preliminary protocols? Law scholars and economists meet to seek a common language and to confront their apparently distant perspectives on the subject, as a contribution for more pragmatic choices of policy makers on the way of social and economic progress.
